TRAINING SUMMARY

This summary provides helpful hints from the Derivative Classification Training module.

- 1. All classified material must be marked.
- 2. What is your Derivative Unique Identifier?
 - a. Birth month (MM)
 - b. Birth Day (DD)
 - c. Last four digits of your MyID (ex. A12345)
 - d. Your last name.

Example: 09052345Jones

- 3. What are the three derivative classification sources?
 - a. Security Classification Guide (SCG)
 - b. DD254
 - c. Source documents (not hearsay)
- 4. When classifying derivative materials be sure to:
 - a. Observe and move forward the original classification determinations.
 - b. Apply standard markings; described later in this training.
 - c. Use caution when paraphrasing, restating or compiling information to ensure accurate classification.
- 5. If you are not certain about the classification of the material it should be marked at the highest possible level, and also with the words "Classification Determination Pending."
- 6. All classified documents must include declassification instructions.
- 7. When using the "multiple sources" classified by line, a bibliography must be included.


DERIVATIVE CLASSIFIER

As a derivative classifier you are responsible to ensure that materials you create contain:

- Classified markings that are immediately apparent
- A banner line
- Portion markings immediately preceding the portion to which it applies
- "Classified by" line including your personal identifier
- Appropriate "derived from" and declassification instructions
- The origination date of the material.



Use caution when extracting information to ensure that it is appropriately marked.
